



How Might Construction Affect Me?

As with many large municipal improvement projects, construction will affect people and neighborhoods. Project plans to reduce disruption include:

- ▶ No roads will be completely closed
- ▶ Pedestrians will be able to walk in their neighborhoods
- ▶ Access to school, homes, and businesses will be maintained
- ▶ Detours will be clearly marked
- ▶ Construction will be done in phases to allow areas to re-open as quickly as possible
- ▶ Special construction techniques will be used where possible to reduce noise, vibration, and dust



Residents

- ▶ Access to residences will be maintained
- ▶ Street parking will be unavailable during construction



Businesses

- ▶ Access will be maintained (at least one driveway)



Drivers

- ▶ Lanes will be narrowed or closed
- ▶ Two-way travel will be maintained; minimal need for single-lane travel and flaggers
- ▶ Detours, traffic controls, and temporary traffic signals will be clearly marked



School

- ▶ Vehicle and bus access will be maintained
- ▶ Pedestrian and bicycle access will be maintained
- ▶ Hours of operations will be coordinated to reduce noise and other disruptions



Pedestrians

- ▶ Pedestrians will be able to walk in their neighborhoods
- ▶ Some sidewalks will be closed; detours will be clearly marked



Bicycles

- ▶ Bike lanes will be closed; bicyclists will need to share the lane with vehicles

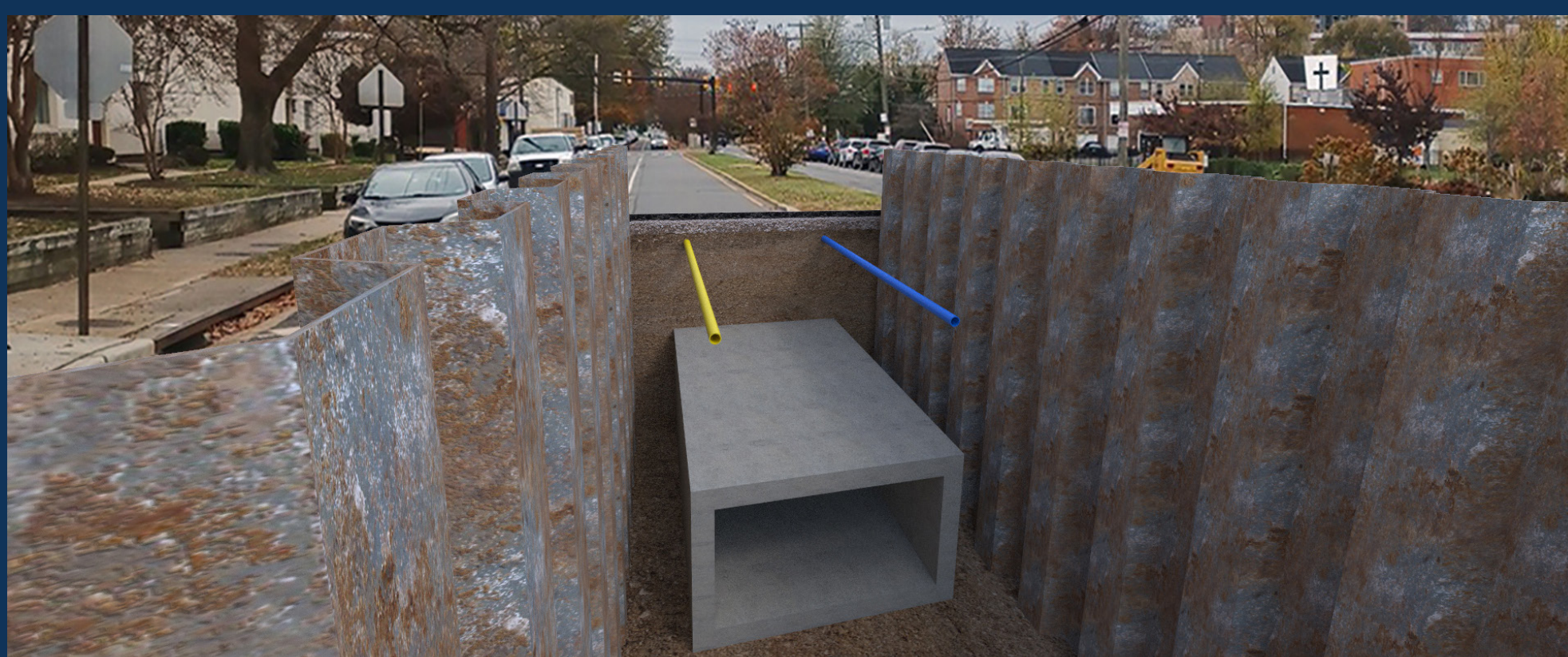


Park Users

- ▶ Trail detours or temporary closure will be clearly marked
- ▶ Four Mile Run Ballfield will be closed for the duration of the project (3.5 years)
- ▶ Access to boat ramp will be detoured around construction

What Will Construction Look Like?

- ▶ Sheeting will extend several feet above ground
- ▶ Barriers will extend to the middle of street to allow for construction access
